ACLA Board President Updates

Library Funding and Governance

- Funding
 - Though not yet finalized, ACLA should see a significant increase in funding, service area, and population size
- Centralized Collections
 - As part of cost-savings measures, WCCLS will move to centralized collections at the county level, rather than each library developing their own collections
 - This is a difficult transition for librarians that have helped to build existing library collections
 - WCCLS is working through how this will be implemented
 - o Once implemented, ACLA will lose a Cataloger
- Levv
 - Current levy expires in 2026
 - November 2025 ballot will have measure for new levy

ACLA Library Director Updates

Library Guardians

- Opt-in model, based on fiscal year (July 1-June 30)
- Minimum donation of \$25 or volunteer minimum of 5 hours during fiscal year
- Can join any time during the year, but will be asked to renew membership by July 1st of each following year
- Must be at least 14 years old to become a Guardian (member)
- Benefits:
 - o Invitation to ACLA Annual Meeting
 - One vote per Guardian at ACLA Annual Meeting
 - Eligibility to join ACLA Board of Directors
 - Invitations to special Library Guardian events (ex: Booktique Preview Shopping Event)
 - Acknowledgement on library donor appreciation wall

Fiscal Year 2025/2026 Budget Update

- ACLA Board of Directors is waiting to see what happens with WCCLS (county) funding
- Anticipating 1% increase in funds over last year
- Have decreased fundraising goal based on observed economic trends
- Also decreased Collections budget by 10%
- Impacts of federal funding with current administration
 - o For ACLA, this impacts Kids Summer Reading program
 - Most impact is at the State Library of Oregon budget

- Listen deeply to what guests and try to meet their needs the best we can
- Guests are welcomed as individuals
- ACLA is responsible for creating and maintaining a welcoming and safe environment
- Resources are offered respectfully in a way that allows individuals to maintain personal dignity
- We trust our guests

Library-Centric Services

- Collection of books, movies, and other materials
- o Programs, including:
 - One-off programs on special topics or performances
 - Informal/passive programs, including:
 - ☐ Seed library started this spring, and 69 seed packets have been taken so far
 - Recurring programs: Preschool Playtime, Book Clubs, Teen Crafternoon, Sit & Stitch, Art Quilt Group, etc.
 - □ Last Tuesday Social Hour has hosted 90 people this fiscal year
 - □ Drop-in Tech Help assisted 115 people during 37 sessions since July 1, 2024
- Seed library started this spring
 - 69 seed packets taken so far

Connect to Community to Support Basic Needs

- School Supply Drive and Free Store
 - Helped 89 people the first year (5 years ago)
 - Helped 210 last year
 - Currently accepting donation for this year's event
- Food pantry collection site
 - In 2024 we collected 965 pounds of food
- Personal care supplies
 - Travel sized hygiene products
 - Period products
- Snacks
 - Supply of snacks and water available to offer to guests with low blood sugar, coughing fits, hunger
 - ☐ Helps staff to feel empowered to offer assistance by offering a snack or water

Connect to Community to Through Outreach and Partnerships

- Schools
 - ACLA gets lots of 2nd graders every May when they take a walking field trip to visit the library
- Aloha Community Farmers' Market
 - Terri is working with the Market Manager to help recruit volunteers and make sure word is being spread about the Farmers' Market
 - They need about 200 more visitors each week than are currently stopping by
- Aloha Community Forum
 - Group of 30+ people working to identify gaps in the community and determine projects
 - Current projects identified:
 - ☐ Trash pick-up and graffiti clean-up
 - □ Community Resource Center
 - ☐ Aloha Community Farmers' Market
- o Community Participation Organization 6 (CPO-6) meetings
 - ☐ In-person meetings often take place at the Aloha Community Library (hybrid)
 - ☐ Meetings are also offered online

Levy

- Coming up, November 2025
- Currently lining up several things so that if the levy passes we can hit "go"
 - o Aloha Community Library lease ends November 2026, discussing facility needs
 - o Expanded service area and population requires expanded service plan
 - o Rething of staffing needs, defining new roles, adding new staff
